Mathematical Development

Nursery Children to know:

- That shapes are all around us and we can name these triangle, circle, square, rectangle
- That we can combine shapes to create new ones
- How to use shapes appropriately for a task matching, inset jigsaws, creating a model or a picture
- The language of weight and can use this to make comparisons between objects
- Some Nursery/finger rhymes that involve numbers and know the words to the rhyme
- That we can count forwards and backwards

Reception Children to know:

- How to describe a sequence of events from a core story using the words first, then, next, after.
- How to use a visual timetable to sequence the events in the morning / afternoon
- The sequence of events in the school day.
- The days of the week and the names of the 4 seasons
- That patterns are all around us i.e. stripes on scarves, spots on gloves etc.
- Know how to continue and create simple ABAB patterns.
- That shapes all around us and to know the names of the 2D shapes: circle, triangle, square and rectangle.
- We can use mathematical language to describe what shapes look like i.e. pointy, sides, straight, curved etc.
- How to subitise with up to 5 objects.
- How to represent numbers using different resources including 5 frames and 10 frames
- The number bonds to 5
- Children to know the 1 more than / 1 less than relationship between consecutive numbers up to 5.

Understanding The World

Nursery Children to know:

- There are 4 seasons in the year and the names of these.
- In the winter it gets very cold and wet and sometimes it snows
- In the Winter we need to wear warm clothes
- That when the water freezes it turns to ice
- When ice melts it turns to water
- That ice is slippery and we need to keep safe
- That maps help us find our way
- The explorers use maps
- Robert Falcon Scott was a famous Polar explorer
- There are different countries in the world and talk about the differences they have experienced or seen in photos

Reception Children to know:

- That seasonal changes occur throughout the year and to know some of the things that are happening now Winter is here.
- That in the Winter it gets cold, wet and sometimes it snows and that snow is frozen water.
- That there may be frost and ice and that this can be slippery and at times dangerous.
- How to take care and be safe when it is cold, frosty and icy outdoors
- There are fewer daylight hours in the Winter which means there is more darkness
- The things we need to do to keep warm, safe and dry in the Winter i.e. warm clothing, warm food, wrapping up etc.
- That when the temperature falls below 0 degrees Celsius the water freezes
- What a thermometer looks like and how you read one
- What ice feels like and observe it melting
- How to use a globe / map to identify where the Arctic and Antarctic regions
- Some of the features of the Arctic and Antarctic and can use the key vocabulary to describe these
- The names of the animals that live in the cold Polar Regions i.e. polar bears, penguins, walrus, artic fox etc.
- The features of these environments and how Polar Explorers like Robert Falcon Scott helped us to understand what these climates are like.
- That ice melts and turns into water and to know that water freezes and turn to ice

Literacy

Nursery Children to know:

- How to make marks that stand for their name
- How to listen attentively to a story that is being read
- How to discuss with others a familiar story and to say if they like it or not
- Rhyming words are words that sound similar and have the same end sound
- How to spot rhymes in stories and talk about if a book is a rhyming book or not
- Characters and events in stories they have heard

Reception Children to know:

- Some of the differences between fiction and non-fiction books
- The names of the different parts of a fiction book i.e.
 cover, spine, author, illustrator, blurb, characters, events
- How to discuss key events in a story
- How to sequence events in a familiar story
- That we can give our own opinions about a story and we can talk about our own likes and dislikes
- How to re-enact a story using props, using some of the key vocabulary from the story heard
- That we blend sounds together to make words
- That we have to read some words on sight and these are called 'tricky words'.
- The names of the different parts a non-fiction book i.e. photographer, contents page, title, glossary, heading, author
- How to hold a pencil correctly using the tripod grip and to use this to make marks, pictures and words
- How to use props to develop play and the key vocabulary to use in order to extend play and share ideas

Expressive Arts and Design

Nursery Children to know:

- How to use resources and props to create small world play and engage in imaginative play with others
- How to develop own ideas and then decide which materials to use to express these
- The names of colours red, blue, green, yellow, orange etc
- Draw shapes to represent objects and explain these to others
- How to look closely at pictures of polar animals and discuss what they can see and then create simple representations using available resources

Reception Children to know:

- The colours to use when creating cold / wintry scenes
- How to use a variety of resources and media when creating pictures, including drawing programs on the computer
- How to add detail to their pictures when creating own polar animal pictures
- The names of the primary colours and how to mix these to make different colours
- Adding white to colours makes it lighter and adding black makes it darker
- How to tear, cut, stick and join to create winter / polar collages.
- How to add different media to create new effects
- How to use shapes to represent objects and how to add more detail to work when drawing / painting.
- How to develop a storyline in their pretend play.
- The name of the artist Claude Monet and that he is a famous artist from France
- One of Monet's famous paintings is 'The Magpie'
- The colours to use to recreate own version of 'The Magpie'
- To match the colours they see and want to represent in their own work
- They can use the work of a famous artist as a stimulus to create their own
- The words of different songs and Nursery Rhymes
- How to use different percussion instruments to create differences in volume and pace - louder to quieter, faster then slower
- That Antoni Vivaldi is a famous composer from Italy
- That a composer is someone who writes music
- That Vivaldi composed a piece of music called 'The Four Seasons'
- How the music changes in the 'Four Seasons' to represent each of the seasons
- When the season winter is represented in Vivaldi's Four Seasons
