


Responses and Outcomes


I think PSHCE education is an important part of the school curriculum



PSHCE topics taught in school can make a real difference to young people's lives



At Ladywood we try our very best to establishing a safe teaching and learning environment for PSHCE education lessons. We want all pupils to feel comfortable and able to ask questions. We pride ourself of the relationships we build with children and hope that these strong bonds help children to feel comfortable in school. I don't like the fact that my child in Year 3 is wanting to know how to have sex.	At Ladywood sex and relationship education is taught in year 5 and year 6. The Relationships Education, RSE, and Health Education (England) Regulations 2019 have made Relationships Education compulsory in all primary schools. Sex education is not compulsory in primary schools. Head teachers will automatically grant a request to withdraw a pupil from any sex education delivered in primary schools, other than as part of the science curriculum. If a pupil is excused from sex education, it is the school's responsibility to ensure that the pupil receives appropriate, purposeful education during the period of withdrawal. There is no right to withdraw from Relationships Education or Health Education.
