Attendance

Our attendance target is 96%. Each week the class with the highest attendance receives an award and £5 credit towards an end of year treat. Last week, **Y2** achieved the highest attendance of 98.3%. **WELL DONE!**

Lates

Polite reminder that if your child/ren arrive between 8.55am and 9.15am they will receive a late mark (L) code. If your child/ren arrive after 9.15am they will receive a (U) code which is also an unauthorised late mark and could lead to a fixed penalty. Absences, whether authorised or unauthorised will bring your child/ren's attendance down.

Illnesses

It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school, nursery or playgroup when they're unwell. Please see illnesses information below.

Polite reminder that if your child/ren are unwell, please ensure contact is made to the office, via the app or leaving a voicemail on 01226 711488. Please ensure a reason for absence is provided daily.

Appointments in school time

Polite reminder that medical/dental appointments need to be arranged outside of school hours, on occasions this may be unavoidable, please always ensure appointment confirmation cards/letters are provided to the school office at the earliest opportunity so these can be added to your child/ren's record.

Home visits

Home visits will be carried out to check on the well-being of children who are absent from school. These visits will take place in cases where no contact can be made to establish reason for absence and on day 3 of absence in all cases, and will continue if absence persists. In some cases, dependent on the circumstances surrounding pupil absence, we may make a home visit sooner. If deemed appropriate, the Education Welfare Officer may make the home visit.

Leave of Absences

Penalty Notices are requested from schools and **issued by the Local Authority** to the parents/carers of statutory school age children, and can be issued per parent, per child. For example: 3 siblings absent for leave of absence in term time could result in **each** parent/ carer receiving 3 separate fines at the below rates.

- **First offence** - The first time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be: £80 per parent, per child paid within 21 days. This fine increases to £160 per parent, per child if paid after day 21, until day 28.
- **Second Offence (within 3 years)** - the second time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.
- **Third Offence and Any Further Offences (within 3 years)** - the third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case may be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court under s.444 of the Education Act (1996) or other legal interventions considered. The Magistrates' Court can order fines up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Failure to pay a Penalty Notice will render you liable to criminal proceedings in the Magistrates Court under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996.



Nursery

This week in Nursery, we have started our new topic of 'Monsters'. We have been reading the stories 'The Great Monster Hunt' and 'Kipper's Monster' where we have tried to guess what the monster is that has been hiding. In Maths, we have been trying to match up the numeral to the amount of objects.

Next week, we will be reading the story of 'Where the Wild Things Are' and 'Morris, the Mankiest Monster'. We will be discussing the events of the story and talking about the characters. In Maths, we will be talking about positional language and trying to describe where objects are

Reception

This week in reception class we have started our new topic about Monsters and have been reading lots of stories about Monsters.

In literacy, we have been reading "Morris the Mankiest Monster" and have been doing lots of talking about the events of the story and talking about different words that we could use to describe Morris. We have then drawn Morris and used our describing words to write words and short phrases about him. The children loved this story and came up with some brilliant ideas.

In our number learning, we have been ordering numbers to 10 with the help of the Numberblocks and unifix cubes and using our reasoning skills to decide which numbers are more than other numbers.

In our wider curriculum learning we read the book the "Colour Monster" and began to talk about our feelings. The children practised drawing faces to represent different feelings and made a monster collage to represent a feeling using the different colours from the story.

On Thursday the children enjoyed World Book Day and looked fabulous in their costumes. They voted for a book that they would like to have read to them by one of the teachers and shared lots of stories with their friends.

Year 1

This week in Year One we have been egg spotter guides and explored different animals that hatch from odd looking eggs. We used our book 'the odd egg' to help us write lots of facts.

In Maths, we added and subtracted from a teen number and then compared numbers using greater, less than and equal to.

In History, we have been further exploring David Attenborough and how to look after the planet. We read a special book about plastic in the ocean and discussed how we can reduce waste.

In PE, we have been using our hands to control the ball when playing basketball.

We also really enjoyed our World Book Day and it was wonderful to spend time discussing our favourite books and dressing up!

Year 2

Year 2 have had another fantastic week of learning and have continued to show great enthusiasm and focus in all areas of the curriculum.

In Reading, we have been learning about India and its location in the world. The children have explored where India is on a map and begun learning key facts about the country. They are developing their understanding of different places around the world and building their geographical knowledge.

In Writing, we have begun writing our own instructions, ensuring we include clear titles, subheadings, conjunctions and bossy verbs. The children are working hard to make their instructions easy to follow and well organised.

In Maths, we have been applying our skills in finding the difference to word problems, using ten frames to support our understanding and reasoning.

In History, we have continued learning about Florence Nightingale, focusing on her trip to Scutari Hospital and the horrendous conditions she witnessed there. The children were thoughtful and reflective in their discussions.

In PE, we have added aiming and shooting to our passing and pivoting skills. In Art, we have been learning about shading to recognise facial features, beginning with carefully drawing an eye.

We also thoroughly enjoyed World Book Day, the children looked amazing in their costumes and loved visiting another teacher to hear an exciting new story.

Next week, we will answer retrieval questions about India, explore more examples of instructions and read a story about a disgusting sandwich to inspire us to write our own. In Art, we will begin defining the proportions of the face.

Year 3

This week in literacy, we have thought of and discussed effective words and phrases when writing a setting description of a tea plantation.

In maths, we have practised our addition skills and we have been adjusting and redistributing when adding numbers to make it easier to find the total.

We have enjoyed celebrating World Book Day this week and we have participated in a variety of exciting activities in school including signing up for a story and inventing our very own book characters!

In history this week, we have learned all about what happened in The Oaks Mining Disaster, including the two possible explanations for what caused the first explosion.

We also practised a cross stitch in our D.T. lesson and we looked at what happens at a carnival in French.

In science, we investigated fruits with different seeds and in P.E. we continued with football and athletics. Please ensure children have their P.E. kits in school **every Thursday and Friday, including outdoor trainers**. As the weather is improving, we will try to get outside when we can

but if children do not have sensible footwear then they will be unable to participate in our lessons due to safety concerns.

In R.E. we have continued to study the Easter story, discussing and answering questions about the key parts of the story and in music we practised our new song about a dragon named Lesley.

In PD, we discussed conflict and how people often have different opinions about various issues. We also talked about how conflicts can be resolved.

Year 4

This week in year 4 we have been writing our own independent adventure stories where we are sent to an alternate realm. We then edited them. Next week we will be starting to look at diary entries and their structures.

In the wider curriculum we have enjoyed World Book Day and continued to work on passing and dribbling in basketball as well as starting our unit of swimming. We have continued to look at the Buddhism religion in RE and the Spanish Armada in history. In science we have continued the unit of sound. Next week we will begin our art topic and start our unit of football.

Year 5

In English, we continue our topic on science fiction by identifying the key features of a short science fiction narrative. We then explored the opening of a science fiction story and identified normal details, and early clues that something is wrong. We used this to help us write the opening few sentences to a science fiction story, including an ordinary place with one strange detail. Next week, we will identify how an author shows a character's feelings through actions.

In Maths, we continued our work on multiplication by multiplying a two-digit number by a single-digit number using partitioning. Next, we applied this to the expanded multiplication method and then to the short multiplication method. We will continue to work on this next week by regrouping the ones to tens and the tens to hundreds.

In topic, we discovered more about Jorvik and the archaeological dig at Coppergate. We found out about some of the fascinating finds and how important these were when finding out about Viking homes and craftspeople.

Year 6

Year 6 have had another busy and engaging week of learning across the curriculum.

In English, we have continued developing our journalistic writing skills. The children explored how different viewpoints can shape a narrative by considering key witnesses and their perspectives. They also practised using direct and reported speech, relative clauses, and modal verbs to add precision and professionalism to their writing. Towards the end of the week, we looked at how active and passive voice can be used for effect and formality in newspaper-style writing.

In Maths, we continued working with fractions, focusing on adding and subtracting related unit fractions before moving on to more challenging problems involving non-unit fractions and different denominators. The children showed great perseverance and developing confidence when tackling these problems.

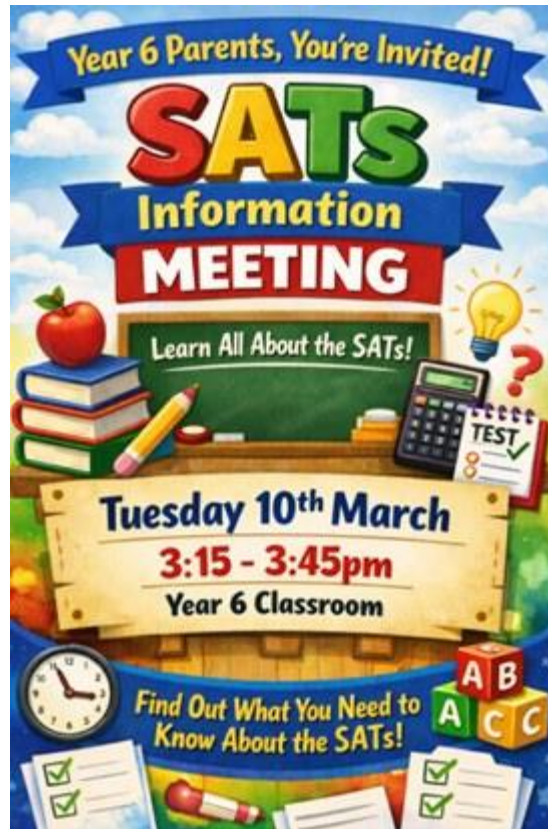
In Science, we learned more about the human circulatory system, identifying the components of blood and their important roles in the body. We also explored the differences between blood vessels, creating labelled diagrams to support our understanding.

Thursday was World Book Day, and it was fantastic to see everyone making such a brilliant effort with their costumes. The children looked amazing and thoroughly enjoyed celebrating their love of reading through a range of fun activities throughout the day.

Alongside this, the children continued their learning in Music, French, Computing, and PE, as well as taking part in our regular Mastering Number and Whole Class Reading sessions.

Well done, Year 6, for another excellent week of hard work and enthusiasm!

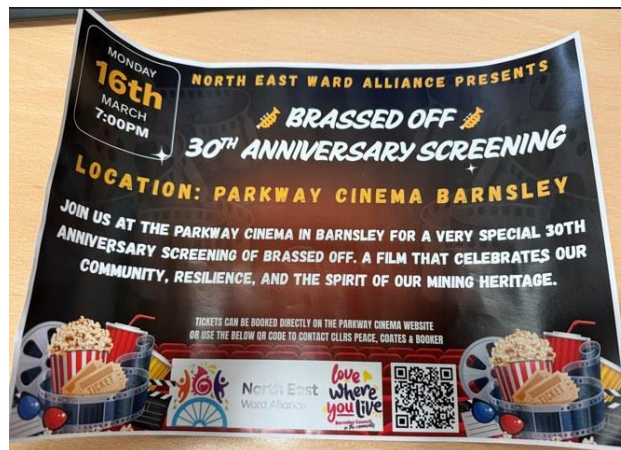
