Lates

Polite reminder that if your child/ren arrive between 8.55am and 9.15am they will receive a late mark (L) code. If your child/ren arrive after 9.15am they will receive a (U) code which is also an unauthorised late mark. Absences, whether authorised or unauthorised will bring your child/ren's attendance down.



Leave of Absences

Penalty Notices are requested from schools and **issued by the Local Authority** to the parents/carers of statutory school age children, and can be issued per parent, per child. For example: 3 siblings absent for leave of absence in term time could result in **each** parent/ carer receiving 3 separate fines at the below rates.

- **First offence** - The first time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be: £80 per parent, per child paid within 21 days. This fine increases to £160 per parent, per child if paid after day 21, until day 28.

- **Second Offence (within 3 years)** - the second time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.
- **Third Offence and Any Further Offences (within 3 years)** - the third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case may be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court under s.444 of the Education Act (1996) or other legal interventions considered. The Magistrates' Court can order fines up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Failure to pay a Penalty Notice will render you liable to criminal proceedings in the Magistrates Court under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996.



Nursery

This week in Nursery, we have been reading the story of 'Hector and the Big Bad Knight'. We have found this book really funny and enjoyed guessing what will happen in the story. In Maths, we have been trying to match the number to the correct amount of objects. We have also explored torches and how they make light.

Next week we will be exploring different types of toys and how they work. Our 'Book of the Week' will be 'There was an old Dragon who swallowed a Knight'. In Maths, we will be looking at positional language and trying to move objects into different positions.

Reception

We have started our topic on "Dragons and Knights" this week. We have really enjoyed the story "Zog" by Julia Donaldson. We have loved finding out about the things that Zog had to learn and "Dragon School". We have done a super job when sequencing the key events in the correct order.

In our Mathematics we have been ordering numbers and have been identifying the number that is 1 more and 1 less than a given number.

We have all been trying hard to form our numbers correctly when recording our own work.

We have been noticing the seasonal changes that are taking place now Spring is here. We have also enjoyed reading lots of Spring stories and using non-fiction books very well to find out more information.

We have all been very excited when talking about World Book Day. We have been talking about our favourite stories and characters and the reasons why we like them.

Year 3

What an exciting week we have had! We had our first swimming lesson as a class and we also celebrated World Book Day and took part in lots of exciting activities!

In English this week, we have written our own descriptions about a beach and the sea. We have continued to choose words for effect and we have used simple, compound and complex sentences, as well as expanded noun phrases in our writing.

In maths, we have continued to identify right-angles in a range of shapes, as well as knowing the difference between rectangles and squares and looking at their definitions in more detail.

In computing, we developed our programming skills by giving the sprite on Scratch specific instructions so it would perform various movements.

In R.E., we continued to learn about Easter and the events of The Last Supper and in history we learned about the events of The Oaks Mining Disaster.

We also filled up our reward jar so we finally got to watch The BFG this week too.

Year 4

This week in Literacy, we have been learning about Viking Gods and Goddesses and planning our non-chronological reports.

In Maths, we have been looking at multiples of 10 and scaling, focusing on the difference between 10x bigger and 10x as many.

In Art, we have been learning about botany, and the children have been developing their observational skills by closely studying and sketching various images of plants.

Year 5

In English this week, we read the first two chapters of "Robot gir"l and collected evidence to infer what we know, think and any evidence that suggests this. We then used multi-clausal sentences to make inferences about Claire and her feelings towards her dad. Next, we made comparisons about characters and used relative clauses.

In Maths, we continued our work on multiplication by multiplying a two-digit number by a single-digit number, using both expanded and short multiplication. We regrouped both ones to tens and tens to hundreds. We then used estimation to support accurate calculations and solve problems. Next week, we will move on to multiplying 3-digit numbers by single-digit numbers.

In Geography, we continued to look at how coastal features are formed. We focused on depositional features and looked at how beaches are formed within bays. We also discussed how beaches can differ along the coastline, depending on what the cliffs are made from. Next, we discussed how coastal management can help to control coastal erosion and how protecting the cliffs can have an impact on the natural environment.

We had a great day celebrating World Book Day and it was lovely to see the children sharing their favourite books with each other. The children created some fabulous artwork, which will be displayed around school.

Year 6

This week in year 6 we have been looking at coordinates and translating shapes which we will need to keep practising at home. Remember along the bottom then up. When translating pick a corner and then move it before plotting. Next week we will be recapping adding and subtracting fractions.

In English we have looked at persuasive leaflets and their features. Next week we will persuade people to choose Camp Green Lake as their preferred destination. In PE, we have had the basketball competition and practised for this on Wednesday. We have also looked at how animals have adapted to survive in the desert.

A huge well done to the football team whom won 8-3 on Tuesday against Milefield with goals from India, Robbie, Jack C, Seth x 2 and Brodie x 3!


