Attendance

Lates

Polite reminder that if your child/ren arrive between 8.55am and 9.15am they will receive a late mark (L) code. If your child/ren arrive after 9.15am they will receive a (U) code which is also an unauthorised late mark. Absences, whether authorised or unauthorised will bring your child/ren's attendance down.

Illnesses

It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school, nursery or playgroup when they're unwell. Please see illnesses information below.

Polite reminder that if your child/ren are unwell, please ensure contact is made to the office, via the app or leaving a voicemail on 01226 711488. Please ensure a reason for absence is provided daily.

Leave of Absences

Penalty Notices are requested from schools and **issued by the Local Authority** to the parents/carers of statutory school age children, and can be issued per parent, per child. For example: 3 siblings absent for leave of absence in term time could result in **each** parent/ carer receiving 3 separate fines at the below rates.

- **First offence** - The first time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be: £80 per parent, per child paid within 21 days. This fine increases to £160 per parent, per child if paid after day 21, until day 28.
- **Second Offence (within 3 years)** - the second time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.
- **Third Offence and Any Further Offences (within 3 years)** - the third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case may be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court under s.444 of the Education Act (1996) or other legal interventions considered. The Magistrates' Court can order fines up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Failure to pay a Penalty Notice will render you liable to criminal proceedings in the Magistrates Court under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996.

Nursery

This week in Nursery, we have started our new topic of 'Houses and Homes'. We have read the story of 'Peace at Last' where we were discussing the different places Mr Bear tries to sleep. We compared this to where we sleep at home. In Maths, we have been practising our careful counting and trying to find numbers in our environment.

Next week, we will be reading the story of "Iggy Peck Architect" and will be designing our own houses. We will also begin to look at different houses around the world and compare these to where we live. In Maths, we will be looking at the different ways in which we can represent numbers by using our fingers and making marks on paper.

Reception

Happy New Year to you all and welcome to Spring Term! It is great to see all the children back and we have had lots of news to talk about and share.

This week we have been reading "Lost and Found" by Oliver Jeffers. This is a great story about a little boy and a penguin who become good friends. Children have been using the new vocabulary when talking about the key events and the feelings of the characters. We have been using our own pictures and words to re-tell the different events.

In our topic sessions we have been talking about Winter and the seasonal changes that take place. We have been talking about the things that we enjoy doing and also the ways in which we can stay safe and warm.


In our Mathematics we have been practising our subitising skills (the ability to look at a small number of objects and recognise how many there are without needing to count). We have been using a variety of resources to develop our subitising abilities.

Everyone has made a great start in their new RWInc groups. Please continue to read daily the books that are sent home and then return these to school each morning. Daily reading at school and at home has an enormous impact on confidence and fluency in reading.

Year 1

A lovely welcome back to the children who have returned to school so well this week! It's been a short and busy week with lots of snow and ice chaos around us but Year One have been amazing!

It's really important that your children are coming with a book bag to school. We can't swap children's reading books or send books home with them without their bag.

We have been fascinated by odd eggs this week and children have been learning where some odd-looking eggs come from and what young they hatch.

In Science, we started looking at everyday materials and identified some objects around us and named what material they were made from.

Year 2

This week we have been learning to add and subtract numbers within 10, we have collected examples of nouns and adjectives and began to learn about the great fire of London: Looking at the difference between London back then and London in the modern day.

Next week we will be learning about adding and subtracting bridging 10, using our collected expanded noun phrases to write a setting description and exploring mechanisms in DT.

Year 3

We have made an excellent start to the new term despite the freezing cold weather outside! In literacy, we have started to read "The BFG" book by Roald Dahl and we have begun to describe some of the giants from the story. We have also used the possessive apostrophe whilst writing too.

In maths, we have practised adding and subtracting ones to three-digit numbers using the partitioning method to make it more simple to solve the calculations.

In computing, we have learned about animation and we have used motion to create our own animations. In geography, we have located and labelled the European countries and in art we have started to look at famous buildings and discuss which ones are our favourite. In R.E., we have learned about the features of a Mosque and in P.E. we have practised our dodgeball and dance skills.

Year 4

A fantastic and interesting first week back where we have been looking at finding how to know if a 4-digit number is a multiple of 3 or 6 quickly and efficiently. Next week, we will be moving onto our 9 times table and practising this.

In English, we have been writing our own stories and remembering to put commas in after a fronted adverbial.

In the wider curriculum we were practising aiming in dodgeball and we have looked at some mountains of the UK in geography.

Could you please ask your children if they can remember the names and heights of the largest mountains in each of the United Kingdom countries?

In RE, we have looked at the prophet Mohammed and his significance as Allah's final messenger and in PD we have looked at how we solve conflicts we may have with our peers.

A quick reminder we do have swimming on Monday (13th) and have been given an extra slot on the 20th January due to the fact we missed Monday's session.

Year 5

Welcome back and we hope you all had a lovely Christmas!

The children have made a great start to the new term; they have all settled well and have worked really hard this week.

In English, we published our setting descriptions, which described 'The Tempest'. We then began reading our new class novel 'Room 13' and looked at how the author, Robert Swindells, builds tension and suspense. Next, we used these techniques in our own piece of writing about a mysterious house and enjoyed sharing these with the class.

In Whole Class Read, we focused on the first chapter of Room 13 and discussed the theme of nightmares. We also made predictions and identified the main problem that the children faced on their school trip to Whitby.

In Maths, we started a new unit on negative numbers. We began by interpreting numbers greater than and less than zero in different contexts. We then explained how the value of a number relates to its position from zero and placed negative numbers on a number line.

In History, we continued our work on Romans and found out about Boudica's rebellion against the Roman rule. We discovered that those who made peace became client rulers and paid money to the Romans; however, Boudica became fed up with the Roman rule and started a rebellion. She then destroyed Roman towns and was eventually defeated by the Romans, who used clever tactics. Next week, we will learn about the buildings and towns of Roman Britain.

Year 6

Welcome back, we hope you've all had a lovely Christmas break and wish you a happy New Year!

In whole class read and English, we have started working on a new text called "Holes" by Louis Sachar. We are enjoying reading this so far and are eager to find out more in the next coming

weeks. In English, we are working towards writing a narrative setting description about a place in the text called Camp Green Lake. In the next couple of weeks, we will also write an historical setting description about the same place before it changed. We have explored the features of a narrative setting description and then started to practise some of the skills such as expanded noun phrases, figurative language and sensory details. We will continue with this next week before having a go at writing our first draft.

In Maths, we have been exploring rounding seven-digit numbers to the nearest one million and power of 10. We found this a little tricky so we will need to keep practising rounding numbers next week. We have also been exploring the most efficient methods to use when completing questions whether this be mentally or using written methods. During the afternoons, we have also been exploring equivalent fractions to help boost us ready for SATs. We will continue with this next week.

In Science, we have started a new unit focusing on Light. This week, we have been identify sources of light and understand that sources of light emit their own light. Next week, we will identify and describe materials that are opaque, transparent and translucent – comparing the amount of light that is able to pass through.
