Dear Parents and Carers,

Today's newsletter starts with some very upsetting news. Mrs Haynes, who has worked at Ladywood for many years in the Early Years Unit, sadly passed away on Sunday night. Mrs Haynes was a kind and caring, well respected member of staff who has worked with most of the children in school supporting them in their early formative years at school. She had been unwell for a long time and had bravely fought her illness while remaining in her role at school. Mrs Haynes loved her job and being present in school was very important to her. We have not formally informed the children but some children and their parents have asked school staff about Mrs Haynes. As a school we would like to pass on our condolences to Mrs Haynes' family, particularly her children who are all ex-pupils of Ladywood, and we give thanks for the part that Mrs Haynes played in school life and the education of the children past and present. Mrs Haynes will be missed.

Mrs Haynes loved Christmas and would have been very excited with all the events that are due to happen in the coming last two weeks of term – in Mrs Haynes' memory we would like to give the children and the staff the opportunity to wear Christmas jumpers, tops or outfits to school on the last day of term, Friday the 20th December.

KS2 children will stay in school on Wednesday 11th December for their evening performance and we will give them a hot dog, a treat and a drink. ## Attendance

Our attendance target is 96%. Each week the class with the highest attendance receives an award and £5 credit towards an end of year treat. Last week, **Year 4** achieved the highest attendance of 99.3%. **WELL DONE!**

### Lates

Polite reminder that if your child/ren arrive between 8.55am and 9.15am they will receive a late mark (L) code. If your child/ren arrive after 9.15am they will receive a (U) code which is also an unauthorised late mark. Absences, whether authorised or unauthorised will bring your child/ren's attendance down.

### Illnesses

It can be tricky deciding whether or not to keep your child off school, nursery or playgroup when they're unwell. Please see illnesses information below.

Polite reminder that if your child/ren are unwell, please ensure contact is made to the office, via the app or leaving a voicemail on 01226 711488. Please ensure a reason for absence is provided.

### Leave of Absences

Penalty Notices are requested from schools and **issued by the Local Authority** to the parents/carers of statutory school age children, and can be issued per parent, per child. For example: 3 siblings absent for leave of absence in term time could result in **each** parent/ carer receiving 3 separate fines at the below rates.

- **First offence** - The first time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be: £80 per parent, per child paid within 21 days. This fine increases to £160 per parent, per child if paid after day 21, until day 28.
- **Second Offence (within 3 years)** - the second time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.
- **Third Offence and Any Further Offences (within 3 years)** - the third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case may be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court under s.444 of the Education Act (1996) or other legal interventions considered. The Magistrates' Court can order fines up to £2500 per parent, per child.

**Failure to pay a Penalty Notice will render you liable to criminal proceedings in the Magistrates Court under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996.**

We have been using a range of vocabulary when saying our number sentences. We have also been using a range of apparatus confidently.


We will continue with our Christmas preparations and nativity rehearsals next week. We will be exploring shape and pattern in our Mathematics.

## Year 1

Year One had a super week.

We started the week off with a special workshop and assembly from the Dog's Trust. Children enjoyed their time getting to know how to approach dogs calmly when out and about and learning what dogs like and dislike.

In Maths this week, we looked at 3D shapes and sorted them into groups. In English, we wrote a letter to a rabbit about stealing the Bears hat, from our book 'I want my hat back.'

Next week is the KS1 performance, you may receive a text notifying you of what your child needs to bring to the performance, this could be in the form of a Christmas jumper or some legging/ trousers to go with their costumes. Children will go home first and return to school at half past four to get ready for the 5pm evening performance on the Thursday.

## Year 2

This week we have written sentences using the facts we have found out about the dodo. We have also planned our own fact file about the dodo bird. In maths, we have recapped strategies for adding and subtracting and solving problems using our skills. In science, we have continued to learn about habitats. We have found out about sea side habitats this week and we can now name plants and animals that are found on the coast. Next week, is our nativity and we have all done so well this week singing the songs and remembering g our words. Our dress rehearsal in on Monday so please bring items that we have asked parents to provide thank you!

## Year 3

This week we visited Cannon Hall Museum as part of our history topic of World War 2. What an amazing day we had! We dressed up as evacuees and pretended we were evacuated to the countryside. We did lots of exciting activities in role as evacuees, including baking carrot cookies and learning about rationing, looking at and making WW2 posters, making a rag rug and sewing socks and having a go at Morse Code. We learned so much about the life of an evacuee and what they experienced in WW2.

In literacy this week, we have written a recount of our school trip, using time adverbials to organise our writing. We have also planned our own letter to our parents in role as an evacuee who has been evacuated to the countryside.

In maths, we have been ordering three-digit numbers and adding and subtracting multiples of 100 using the knowledge of number facts that we already have.

In science, we have continued to learn about fossils and we have looked at some examples. We also discussed the skills that would be needed to become a palaeontologist.

In D.T., we have learned about the nutritional information on food items and how this can help us to make healthier choices.

We have also been practising for our Christmas concert too, making sure we are using our best singing voices!

## Year 4

This week in year 4 has seen us complete our unit on perimeter by adding and multiplying rectilinear shapes and using repeated addition and multiplication to solve regular shape problems. We have also started work on adjacent numbers in a timetable as well as discussing the words factor, product and multiple. Next week we will look at the 6's and 9 times tables. In English we have planned a retell of the "Iron Man" and started to write that. This will be completed next week before writing our own stories that are loosely based on the "Iron Man" with characters that we have designed. In the wider curriculum we have completed our evaluations of our art work, practised swimming techniques, looked at how the internet is made up and continued to practise songs for the Christmas performance. I know all the KS2 children have been working hard on this and it will be great to see you on Wednesday or Thursday to support the children in the Live performances.

Finally, a huge well done to the year 3/4 tag rugby team who competed at Cherrydale last week playing 8 games winning 6 and drawing 2 conceding only 3 tries all afternoon and scoring 12 with a number of different try scorers. This meant we won the tournament overall by a clear margin.

## Year 5

This week in Maths, we explained the most efficient strategies when adding and subtracting quantities of money. We used mental methods, number lines and column addition and subtraction. Next week we will find the change when purchasing several items.

In English, we began reading William Shakespeare's 'The Tempest' and collected words and phrases which describe the violent storm. We then worked in groups to create soundscapes of a storm using our voices and bodies. Next, we enjoyed performing them to the rest of the class and summarised the key events from the story so far. We also made predictions about the story and wrote our own questions. Next week, we will look at creating imagery through personification and similes.

During Whole Class Read this week, we found out about another 'Real-Life Mystery' by studying stories about strange crop circles. We used inference skills to find evidence for and against humans creating them and studied the case file in detail.

## Year 6

This week in English, we have been exploring what a balanced argument is. We started off the week by looking at an example of a balanced argument which discussed the question 'Should children be allowed chocolate for breakfast?' We had a great discussion around the reasons for and against this which caused a small debate in class. We have then started to explore the skills needed to be able to write our own balanced argument. We now understand what modal verbs are and are able to identify and use these within our writing. Next week, we will explore more skills and start to plan our own balanced argument based on 'Should Cameron have a pigs heart or not?'

In Maths, we have been ordering, comparing and calculating with numbers up to 8 digits. We found this pretty easy and have shown great confidence when trying to read and write longer numbers. We have explored the composition of numbers to solve problems and discovered ways to add and subtract mentally without bridging a boundary.

In Science, we have been exploring how scientists group plants into groups. We discovered that there are 4 groups of plants which are mosses, ferns, angiosperms and gymnosperms. We used the iPad to research examples of the different types of these plants.

We have been concentrating on our Christmas performance this week in the afternoon. It is now all coming together nicely and we cannot wait to show you next week! Remember our performances are on Wednesday 11th at 5pm and Thursday 12th at 9:30am.


