Dear Parents and Carers,

This week we have had several parents and carers that were rightly uncomfortable about a parent being present on school premises wearing a body camera. I would like to reassure all parents and carers that this is not acceptable on school grounds under any circumstances and that the school is working in the background to resolve this matter. Using any recording device on school premises is a safeguarding risk as children could be filmed unintentionally. Staff are monitoring the situation on school grounds and would not hesitate to take the appropriate course of action to ensure the safety of our children. Should anyone feel that themselves or their child(ren) have been filmed upon leaving the school premises we would advise you to contact the appropriate authorities.

This week we have focused on 'Stranger Danger' in assemblies and the children have been taught 3 rules to remember to keep them safe particularly with the half term holiday approaching. We have also spoken about 'safe adult' and they have been encouraged to talk to their parents and carers about who their safe adults are. Please remember that tomorrow is an INSET day for children and therefore we break for half term today and return on Monday 2nd June.

As you are aware we have had some staffing issues that have been beyond our control since the start of the calendar year. We have done our very best to manage the situation strategically with the best interest of the children in mind. Sadly there has been some unsettled behaviour and a few children have persistently made the wrong choices and let themselves down. It would be tremendous if parents and carers could remind their children of being respectful, resilient and polite. We instil these values into the children and encourage them to use their thinking brain to make the correct choices – if parents and carers do the same I am confident we can get all the children back on track. Thank you in anticipation of your support.

There will be some further staffing changes when we come back to school following the half term holiday as follows;

- w/c 02.06.25 Year 6 will be taught by Mr Bowering in the morning and Mrs Heeley in the afternoon in order to support them with their final SATS work - writing.
- w/c 02.06.25 Year 4 will be taught by Mrs Heeley in the morning and Mr Bowering in the afternoon to support them with their upcoming Multiplication Times Check.
- w/c 09.06.25 Mr Bowering will return to Year 4 for the rest of the year and a teacher is being sought for Year 6.

Lates

Polite reminder that if your child/ren arrive between 8.55am and 9.15am they will receive a late mark (L) code. If your child/ren arrive after 9.15am they will receive a (U) code which is also an unauthorised late mark and could lead to a fixed penalty. Absences, whether authorised or unauthorised will bring your child/ren's attendance down.

Polite reminder that medical/dental appointments need to be arranged outside of school hours, on occasions this may be unavoidable, please always ensure appointment confirmation cards/letters are provided to the school office at the earliest opportunity so these can be added to your child/ren's record.

Home visits


Home visits will be carried out to check on the well-being of children who are absent from school. These visits will take place in cases where no contact can be made to establish reason for absence and on day 3 of absence in all cases, and will continue if absence persists. In some cases, dependent on the circumstances surrounding pupil absence, we may make a home visit sooner. If deemed appropriate, the Education Welfare Officer may make the home visit.

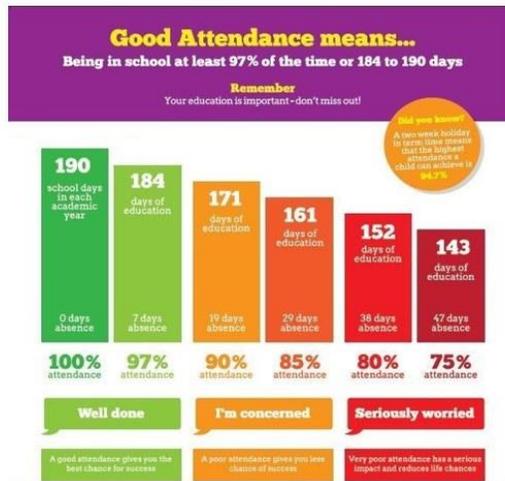
Leave of Absences

Penalty Notices are requested from schools and **issued by the Local Authority** to the parents/carers of statutory school age children, and can be issued per parent, per child. For example: 3 siblings absent for leave of absence in term time could result in **each** parent/ carer receiving 3 separate fines at the below rates.

- **First offence** - The first time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be: £80 per parent, per child paid within 21 days. This fine increases to £160 per parent, per child if paid after day 21, until day 28.
- **Second Offence (within 3 years)** - the second time a Penalty Notice is issued the amount will be £160 per parent, per child paid within 28 days.
- **Third Offence and Any Further Offences (within 3 years)** - the third time an offence is committed a Penalty Notice will not be issued, and the case may be presented straight to the Magistrates' Court under s.444 of the Education Act (1996) or other legal interventions considered. The Magistrates' Court can order fines up to £2500 per parent, per child.

Failure to pay a Penalty Notice will render you liable to criminal proceedings in the Magistrates Court under Section 444 of the Education Act 1996.

After School Clubs


After school clubs available for the rest of the academic year are live for booking on the school gateway app. These are **free of charge**. After school club information is as follows:

Nursery

This week in Nursery, we have been reading the story of 'Jack and the Beanstalk'. We have discussed different versions of the story and made comparisons. We have also been discussing what plants need to grow by growing our own virtual plants. In Maths, we have been learning about height and trying to use language to describe the height of objects.

After Half Term, we will be reading the story of 'The Tadpole's Promise' where we will be looking at the life cycle of butterflies and frogs. In our Curriculum lessons, we will be looking at where different animals live. In Maths, we be counting out amounts and looking at the different ways that these can be represented.

As the weather is heating up, please ensure that you child is bringing a sun hat to school everyday. We have a few spare hats but not enough for all children to wear one at once. Thank you

Reception

We have loved reading "Hairy Maclary". We have enjoyed the rhyming in the story and have identified pairs of rhyming words. We have thought of some super words to describe the characters in the story. We have drawn our own pictures of the characters and have sounded out own words when writing our labels.

In our topic work sessions we have continued with our work on traditional tales. This week we have been reading "Jack and the Beanstalk". We are trying to encourage children to use expression when taking on the role of a character.

In our Mathematics we have been using a number line to help us position numbers in the right place. We have also been using a number line to help us with addition and subtraction tasks. We have been learning how to jump backwards and forward accurately along a number line.


When we come back after the half term holiday we will be focussing on transition. We will be talking about growth and changes. We are particularly excited about having visits to the big playground with Year 5 buddies.

Year 1

This week in English, Year One have been writing an information leaflet all about penguins. We have found out lots of fun facts including, where penguins live, different species and how they move around.

In Maths, the children continued to work hard on counting money. This week we had to skip count in a range of 2s, 5s and 10s to get a total value.

In Art, we have been learning about sculptures. Year one used modelling clay to make a sculpture inspired by artist Barbara Hepworth. Her sculptures had inside and outside spaces. The children had some very creative ideas.

We have sent our runner bean plants home, it was amazing to watch them grow in such a short amount of time!

Year 2

This week we have started our new book "The Rang-Tan" in whole class reading, we have had a wonderful time researching facts about the rainforests and how they are being destroyed so that palm trees can be planted in order to harvest palm oil, we were shocked to find out that over 50% of products in shops actually contain palm oil. We have practiced our inference skills throughout this book by discussing how the characters might be feeling about what is happening to the rainforests and practiced our retrieval skills by answering questions related to the text and finding evidence about the rainforest destruction to support our answers.

This week we have also had lots of fun completing practice 'quizzes' (SAT's) ready for our informal 'quizzes' after the holidays. These 'quizzes' are just a little check of what we know and have learned this year so that we can tell our new teacher next year, what we already know and what we need to learn more of! We have all worked like champions and been so positive throughout and are actually really looking forward to real things after half term! In DT we have used a range of materials to complete our fire engines and experimented with different joining techniques to bring the final piece together. All our hard work has paid off and they look amazing!

Year 3

In English this week, we have re-capped past and present tense and we have focused on identifying perfect present tense in writing. We have also had a go at using it in our own writing. After the half-term holiday, we will be writing independently about earthquakes and volcanoes.

In maths, we have used what we have learned to solve a variety of three-digit addition and subtraction calculations. We have set some homework for over the half term holiday so that children can continue to practise these skills.

In art we have continued to focus on line and we have used a technique called continuous line drawing to help us sketch self-portraits.

In geography, we have learned about the names of different volcanoes and we have labelled a diagram of a volcano using the correct terminology.

In P.E. we played a game of cricket and in French we learned the names of different fruits and vegetables.

In science we learned about different animals and we researched what they ate.

Thank you for your continued support and we hope you all have a lovely half-term break.

Year 4

In English, we wrote diary entries from the perspective of Lord Carnavon or Lady Evelyn about exploring the tomb of Tutankhamun and we are now beginning to look at biographies. In reading we have used and found a range of synonyms related to the Mongol Empire and Genghis Khan.

In Maths, we have been placing mixed numbers on unmarked number lines as well as developing our skills of estimation. Next week we will look at the comparison of mixed numbers including when the denominators are different.

In RE, we have learnt about the Ploughing Festival and will be looking at new festival traditions next week. In French, we have been naming a range of jungle animals which we will continue practicing next week. In Geography we looked at the uses of rivers and our next focus will be pollution and erosion.

Year 5

This week in English, we enjoyed designing our own mechanimals (a hybrid of a robot and an animal). We were inspired by our class novel 'Cogheart' and wrote character descriptions to go with them. We also continued writing our short science fiction narratives and began editing and publishing them. After half-term, we will start our new book 'The Lost Thing'.

In Maths, we completed our work on division through solving multi-step problems using efficient division strategies. Next, we started our new unit on calculating with decimal fractions and explained the effects of multiplying and dividing a number by 10, 100 and 1000. Next, we will use our knowledge of multiplication and division to convert between units of measure.

In Design and Technology, we started our new unit on 'Bridges'. We explored ways in which pillars and beams are used to span gaps and used technical vocabulary to explain how beams are constructed. We tested the effectiveness of different beam/pillar designs and evaluated them. Next we will explore was in which trusses can be used to strengthen bridges.

Year 6

This week we have been working hard on our writing- writing a new piece and editing our old ones ready for writing assessments after the holidays. We will continue with these after the break. In the afternoons we have been looking at topic and deserts again finishing our reports of different deserts of the world. We have also continued PD looking at alcohol and drugs.
